### 2020 Census Ambassador Talking Points Faith-Based Leaders

### Why Does the Census Matter?

When we are short-counted, we are short-changed. Census data is used to decide how much funding our region receives for hospitals, schools, roads, health insurance, public works, and so much more – our quality of life is at stake if we are undercounted.

Our voices matter. Census data is used to decide the number of representatives in Congress. New Yorkers deserve to be fully and accurately represented in our government, and an undercount would undermine our voices.

Completing the Census is simple and safe. There are just a few short questions on the Census questionnaire that can be answered in 10 minutes or less, either online, by phone, or by mail. If you choose to answer by phone, you can speak with someone in one of 13 languages. Your information is protected by Title XIII, which means that the Census Bureau cannot share your information with anyone – not even other branches of the government. If a Census worker shares your information, they will face severe fines and even jail time.

We will live with the consequences of these questions for the next 10 years. We only have one chance to get this right. The funding levels and Congressional seats that are set in the 2020 Census cannot be changed until 2030. This is our only opportunity to set Long Island on the right course for the decade ahead.

**Every single person counts.** The Census can be a tool for empowerment and bringing our communities together. It is a bipartisan issue – everyone benefits when everyone is counted. By completing the Census, we can all contribute to a brighter future for our region.



# 2020 Census Ambassador Talking Points Faith-Based Leaders

### **Key Points for Faith-Based Leaders**

# Faith based institutions are trusted community hubs that can provide Census assistance and information.

In a time in which distrust of the government is a barrier to participation, faith leaders can bring information to their congregations about the Census and why it is so important to respond in 2020.

#### Faith based institutions can mobilize their communities.

Faith leaders can spread information to their congregations, creating events like "Census Sundays/Saturdays/Fridays" to call attention to the upcoming Census and everything it impacts. Faith leaders can mobilize their communities to canvas and march collectively to show just how much the Census matters to their community.

#### Everyone deserves to be counted.

Every single human being counts, and the Census is an opportunity to ensure that our funding and our political voices reflect this. There are scriptural references to the Census that can be used by faith leaders to show the importance of this act. Everyone possesses inherent worth, dignity, and value – but our communities cannot be valued if they are invisible.

#### Completing the Census is simple, safe, and secure.

All information provided to the Census Bureau is confidential and protected by law. While this will be the first Census with the option to complete the questions online, everyone will still be able to fill out the Census by phone or by mail.

#### Our community benefits when everyone is counted.

The Census influences funding for programs and resources that our community depends on, like schools, hospitals, food assistance, health insurance. We all have a civic and moral responsibility to ourselves and to our neighbors to complete the Census in 2020.

# 2020 Census Ambassador Checklist Faith-Based Leaders

# What Can You Do To Help?

Communicate the importance of the Census to your network using the following channels: bulletins, newsletters, mobile apps, robocalls, digital bulletin boards, prayer lines, radio shows, and any other communications that your congregation utilizes.
Include the Long Island CCC's logo in your email signature and promote the Pledge to be Counted. HWCLI created an online pledge where Long Islanders can sign up to show their commitment to the Census and receive email reminders this spring.
Post social media graphics across your various social media platforms to reach your digital followers. Post a short video in which you speak about how important Census completion is to the well-being of our communities and why you plan to fill out the Census.
Educate your congregation about the different ways that they can complete the Census. Encourage your congregation to call the Census phone line after services and complete the Census before going home.
Work together with key community leaders to create Census marches to mobilize communities or hold fairs and exhibitions after worship that highlight Census participation.
Reach out to youth ministries to galvanize activism among your congregants. Youth ministries can devise creative strategies for promoting the Census through social media, volunteering to give out fliers at local events, and sharing information with friends, classmates, and family.
Share Census information and materials through food pantries and charitable shops. Use outreach ministries to reach historically undercounted communities.
Mention the spiritual value of being counted at faith festivals and holy celebrations. Faith leaders can connect the Census to the inherent dignity and worth of every human being.

#### WHAT IS THE CENSUS?

The U.S. Constitution mandates a decennial census to count every person residing in the country. The census is designed and carried out by the U.S. Census Bureau and takes place starting in March 2020 and continues through August. The census can be completed:

#### WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

An undercount of Long Island's population could result in a funding loss for schools, infrastructure, health care services, and economic development.

In addition, with just a 0.6% undercount, New York stands to lose two congressional representatives, putting our fair share of representation and our voices at risk.

# In addition to your address, The 2020 Census Will Ask About Your Household:

The number of people in the household on April 1.

Include everyone in your home, even if they are not related to you. The census counts all people in the U.S., including small children, noncitizens, renters – everyone. A second question asks if any additional people were staying in the household on Apr 1.

Do you own or rent your home?

Telephone number

This will only be used if needed for official Census Bureau business

# The 2020 Census Will Ask About the People Who Live in Your Household:

Name, sex, age, and date of birth of each person in the household, and whether they usually live or stay somewhere else.

#### Relationship to the person filling out the form

#### Race

You can choose one or more races. If you identify as multiracial, you can check the box or boxes for your racial groups and write in additional detail about your racial background(Example: Check box "Black," write in "African American" and check box for "Chinese."). Not all racial groups are listed as check box options. If your racial group is not listed, you can write in additional detail about your racial background.

#### Hispanic origin

Hispanic origin is considered an ethnicity, not a race. You can mark that you are not of Hispanic origin, or mark that you are Hispanic and note your ethnic origin.
