MINUTES:

Minutes were reviewed and discussed. A motion was made by Mr. Kaufman to approve the January 16, 2013 minutes as amended. The motion was seconded by Mr. Machtay. Motion carried.

Historic Trust Docket:

Director's Report:

Mr. Martin updated the Council on the following:

- 1. Housing Program:
 - No new updates to the housing program.
- 2. Custodial Agreements:
 - No new updates/status quo. The County is still working on a few agreements to get them to signature.
- 3. Proposed LI Maritime Museum Surface Water Transportation Center (Boathouse)

The marine railway was reviewed as part of the conceptual plan for the LIMM site in 2002 and approved by CEQ. Since that time, the need for a boathouse for the restoration of LIMM's historic boats has become more apparent. In 2005 LIMM amended the conceptual plan to add the boathouse. The CEQ and the Legislature approved the concept of the boathouse at that time. Today there is a full set of plans for review and comment. Mr. Steve Jones, the Executive Director of the Long Island Maritime Museum, and Lawrence Feeley, Architect with BBS Architects, gave a brief history of the location, the need for the boathouse, and the details of the project. Mr. Jones also explained the grant LIMM received towards the cost of this project. Ms. Spencer noted that she felt the design was more modern than it should be. That if you were to look at old boathouse's they were of a very simple design. The more modern design relates more to the visitor aspect. Mr. Jones noted that historically boathouses weren't designed to have walkways and decks they were originally meant as work areas. The project is fully funded by the County and would be largely reimbursed by a New York Department of Transportation Grant. The County is providing all the money upfront. The County and LIMM are both providing \$63,000 in additional matching funds for a total project amount of \$630,000.

A motion was made by Mr. Kaufman. Mr. Bagg noted that the design and application have been approved by NYSDEC and other agencies involved and that the County as Lead agency issued a determination of non-significance as of the May 24th, 2005 CEQ resolution. The Historic Trust approves the design and application. The motion was seconded by Ms. Growney. Ms. Spencer opposed the motion. Motion carried.

4. Proposed LI Maritime Museum Entry Doors

Mr. Martin reported that the Main Entry Doors to the Museum were included in the 2002 conceptual plans for the Maritime Museum. The original doors were actually for a garage. The building was constructed in the 1920's as a garage for the estate and had two large wood panel doors. The building was not originally a carriage house. There is a need to provide a larger entry so LIMM can move historic boats and other items in and out of the building for exhibits. The existing doors are just standard doors installed a number of years ago. Mr. Jones gave a background of the project funding. The money is coming from the State Dormitory Authority because it was a member item from 2006 and was assigned to the Dormitory Authority. Mr. Jones worked with the Dormitory Authority to repurpose the 2006 grant for this project because LIMM wanted to improve handicap access to the Museum and the energy efficiency of the doors. LIMM also wanted to take advantage of the fact that the original flooring inside the building is heavy ceramic tile that could absorb passive solar heat through a door with glass windows. Mr. Jones noted that everyone at LIMM agreed that the main entrance needed to be spruced up because it is the main entrance and really the face of the Museum. The main obstacle in redesigning the door was that LIMM wanted to have the option of moving large vessels in and out of the front exhibit hall.

Mr. Martin introduced Joel Snodgrass from Steward Preservation Services, who had worked on the design of the doors with BBS Architects. Mr. Martin noted that Parks has essentially approved the project as part of the 2002 conceptual plan. LIMM didn't have the exact design in 2002, but the need to install large doors was part of the conceptual plan approved by the Department and CEQ in 2002. SEQRA requirements with respect to the conceptual plan were completed in 2002. Mr. Bagg stated that, for all intents and purposes, SEQRA is complete.

Ms. Spencer made a motion to approve the design solution for the door replacement. Ms. Growney seconded. Mr. Bagg noted again that the County acted as lead agency when SEQRA was completed in 2002. Motion carried.

5. Proposed Timber Point Club House Renovations for Office/Public Assembly Use

Mr. Martin gave background on the two projects up for review at the Timber Point Club House. The projects are the stair tower and new windows and doors for the south wall of the dining room. The projects were originally part of Suffolk County's upgrade of the building. Three phrases of work were done but the final phase was not fully funded. New York State Building Code and Suffolk County Department of Public Works require an additional staircase to bring the building fully to code for access and use of second floor's east wing. Right now the east wing is closed to office and public use. These two projects were not funded by the County when Suffolk County Parks advertised for new a caterer in 2013. The County added the stair tower project to the capital improvements

required by the new concessionaire. The windows were not required in the contract but there was previous agreement that the windows should be replaced. Lessing's Caterers is contractually required to build the stair tower as part of their capital improvements to the site. The Council reviewed the photographs and concepts presented for the stair tower and windows. Mr. Feeley from BBS Architects explained the improvements.

Mr. Kaufman noted that the Council was concerned about the historic integrity of the building, that further consideration should be given to adding more windows to the proposed stair tower, and that the project design should be revisited.

Mr. Kaufman made a motion to table the project for the preparation a stair tower design revision that includes more windows. Seconded by Ms. Spencer. Motion carried.

PROJECT REVIEW:

Recommended Type II Actions:

A. <u>Ratification of Recommendations for Legislative Resolutions Laid on the Table for February 5, 2013.</u>

Mr. Kaufman noted I.R. 1083-2013, which makes a SEQRA determination for the Coastal Shellfish Restoration Program. Mr. Kaufman called up Brookhaven Planning to inquire whether the Town had completed SEQRA for the Shellfish Restoration Program. Mr. Kaufman had not heard back from the Town of Brookhaven. Mr. Bagg noted that it was an unlisted action and that the Council does not have to rely on the Town. It is up to the Council to complete SEQRA and the matter can proceed at the County level before going to the Town.

Mr. Scully drew the Council's attention to I.R. 1035-2013. He had inadvertently left out the SEQRA classification. It is a recommended Type II action under 6 NYCRR 617.5c (20) and (27).

Mr. Kaufman made a motion to accept staff recommendations as presented and amended for the February 5, 2013 Legislative Resolutions. The motion was seconded by Mr. Machtay. Motion carried.

Proposed Timber Point Club House Renovations for Office/Public Assembly Use

Mr. Martin reminded the Council that we still had the windows for the dining room at the Timber Point Club House. They would like to get going on the project and would like the Council's recommendations. Mr. Feeley from BBS Architects gave a presentation on the current dining room windows and the replacement design. Mr. Martin noted that the replacement would bring back the multi-pane design that was originally there and would improve the design of the door.

Ms. Growney made a motion to approve. Ms. Spencer seconded the motion. Motion carried.

OTHER BUSINESS:

Mr. Bagg noted that there is a Newsday Editorial Opinion by Larry Swanson entitled "Surge Protector" in members' folders.




















Surface Water Transportation Center LIMM

As per our previous discussion, <u>Steward Preservation Services</u> (<u>SPS</u>) was asked by the <u>LIMM to assist with developing a new main entrance door assembly</u>, to replace a more recent installation the museum felt was not well suited to museum operations and not in keeping with the historic appearance of the building. Based upon SPS's specialization in historic structures including custom design, fabrication and installation of historic replica doors, the museum requested coordination of an appropriate design that would address a variety of uses, while exploring potential aesthetic options, and which would be carried through to implementation stages. To facilitate this process, SPS has worked in collaboration with BBS Architects, in similar capacity on previous historic projects such as the Timber Point Club House, and who is also working simultaneously at LIMM regarding a new boat shed design.

It was initially conveyed by LIMM that the goal of the new design project was to replace the existing modern door/frame assembly (below the window lintel level) with a new configuration that would facilitate both daily use, and very infrequent "wide-open" use (opening up to a maximum width/height) in order to accommodate the exchange of large boat exhibit displays. If possible, the inclusion of increased glazing for passive solar gain to the interior quarry tile was desired. The museum was receptive to new design concepts, however given the historic nature of the structure, the design team included potential accommodation of historic reference to the degree possible.

A fairly in-depth review and design development process was carried out, starting with establishing relevant historic precedent for reference (i.e. review of historic plans/elevations, and 'as-built'/constructed - from historic photographs and surviving evidence at the site). From there the team explored a series of design options to reflect separately both the historic 'design' vs. the original doors actually constructed in the field, as slight variations existed. The review further addressed the requirement of working within physical constraints and function requirements of the site.

The team also <u>explored alternate aesthetic and functional design approaches</u>, including entirely non-historic, modern designs such as lightweight metal-framed door assemblies, partial and/or full glass wall/door configurations, etc. - in order to explore contrasting operational uses, to

allow maximum solar gain and to provide possible alternative aesthetic options that could be value-weighted within the overall assessment. Upon further examination however, it was determined that none of these alternate approaches proved functional – either within this specific museum setting, for required daily function and use, and/or set within maritime conditions.

Based upon this evolution, <u>a logical functional design departure</u> included moving away from the original sliding door system used for the original automobile garage purpose, to a new alternate hinged door configuration. This change of emphasis was based largely on required functionality of use that is tailored to the target visitor type and normal/average use level at the museum, while accommodating improved weather protection/sealing, and addressing needed operational ease in gaining full width/height opening during periodic exchange of museum displays.

Through this process, the team <u>returned to a traditional wood door configuration</u> that would both function properly for the intended museum use, and will also allow an aesthetic reflection of the original historic design intent. Through this, the team redesigned a new configuration that includes a 'door within a door', i.e. by employing a larger outer framework which is comprised of two larger hinged doors, that within each contains a smaller hinged door. During normal use, each of the combined outer/inner door configuration "halves" each closes against a central removable vertical mullion bar (i.e. the larger/smaller doors close against the bar both individually and as a combined unit). For museum exhibit changes, the mullion bar can be periodically removed to allow a full-width opening for display/boat transfer, similar to the purpose and configuration of the current double doors/frame used at the metal boat storage building located on the southeast side of the site.

The proposed new assembly reflects the aesthetic of the historic doors, through the geometry and distribution of decorative recessed flat panels that were inherent to the original design. To provide distinction within the new design, the flat panel arrangement within the larger outer frame will be made primarily of wood and recessed with simple trim (reminiscent of the original construction), whereas the inner doors and "transom" area directly above (of the larger outer hinged framework) will be "glazed" with insulated glass to allow solar pass-through, and to provide improved weather-proof efficient thermal benefit (the doors will also be weather-stripped on all sides to prevent draft and energy loss). Through this, the aesthetic design approach both distinguishes the central emphasis of the "inner"/daily use doors, and provides for increased passive solar gain to the masonry floor within the museum.

The <u>use of new hinges</u> will be limited to the larger/outer door framework, whereas the smaller inner doors will use both "invisible" recessed door hinges and closers to allow a seamless clean aesthetic that creates the appearance of single/full door "halves", in keeping with the appearance of the historic sliding panels. <u>Operational hardware</u> for opening/closing will utilize exterior door pulls that include rectangular back plates which reflect the original exterior hardware, and minimal-sized interior push bars are being considered to negate the use of standard inferior-aesthetic panic bars (pending compliance with ADA code requirements in historic structures).

The entire door <u>assembly is intended to be constructed of</u> mahogany in order to provide weather durable, rot-resistant materials for long-term functional use within a maritime environment. A more recent concrete entry apron will require removal and custom replacement to allow the new door/frame assembly to be installed with a new weather resistant threshold. The new door/frame assembly will be finished with a high-quality exterior grade primer/paint system, which is assumed to be painted a similar white to that existing (based upon the current painting scheme, and simultaneously reflective of the historic photographs). Note: if required, a representative paint sample will be extracted for analysis via microscopic examination and verification color matching for replication.

Separately but as part of the overall design project, the <u>installation of protective exterior storm panel inserts</u> is intended for the surviving historic round headed window ensemble that exists directly above the doors. The new storm panel inserts are intended to be visually unobtrusive, by employing small aluminum edge frames, and by being set within the recessed historic window framework. The panels are designed to be fixed in place but will provide specific protective weather-stripping to foster "breathing" and are removable to allow periodic maintenance to the windows behind. As the windows are at an elevation above the doors and the impacted area of the interior will not use light sensitive displays, the use of tempered safety glass and/or UV filtering was not deemed necessary at this time. This design technique has been used successfully at other historic house museums, which addresses improved protection of historic windows while simultaneously allowing an energy efficient, cost effective and aesthetically appropriate option for consideration.

- <u>Current photographs</u>: Of the **existing modern door assembly**. Note closed-in area of door assembly lintel below the original round headed window.
- <u>Historic blueprint copies</u>: Of the original **exterior elevation and floor plan** showing the aesthetic recessed flat panel arrangement and sliding doors.
- <u>Historic photographs</u>: (2 photos, c. 1960's) showing **general overall views** from the southwest, of the original sliding automobile garage doors; note the original recessed flat panels, door hardware with flat back panel, and matching entry door to the east side; and (2 photos, 1969) showing **closer detail views** of the original sliding garage doors from the southeast; note the original door opening and lintel size, recessed flat panels, door hardware with flat back panel, and round headed window with central top vent pane above.

built"/originally constructed from historic photographs above) and (**Scheme D**) alternate increased glazing for maximum passive solar gain. Note: the glass/wood/weight ratio and use of full sized doors as depicted were ultimately deemed <u>not</u> adequately functional for daily operational use.

 - A) Use of similar materials and overall design relationship,
 - B) Use and distribution of flat recessed panels,

As LI prepares for future storms, remember what lagoons can and can't do

Thile the devastation of superstorm Sandy is still fresh in our minds, planners and emergency managers are struggling with how to be better prepared for similar events in the future. Part of the debate concerns the value of preserving - and even creating soft, green, marsh-type environments in critical locations, as opposed to constructing hard, technological fixes such as stormsurge barriers. Long Island's extensive South Shore lagoon system, rich with tidal marshes, can inform that discussion.

There's no question that the barrier islands and marshes reduced the impact of Sandy on the "mainland" of Long Island. The barrier islands absorbed and reflected wave energy and channeled wave-generated currents parallel to the coast. Dunes, where present, greatly improved the barrier islands' effectiveness.

Much of the sand that made up the now badly eroded barrier islands is temporarily naturally being stored in offshore sandbars and will be transported shoreward once again during the relatively calm oceanic conditions of summer. As the storm surge - the difference between the storm-driven water level and the predicted tide - flooded the lagoons through inlets, breaches and overtopping the beaches, the friction created by the marsh grasses slowed the progression of the surge. Without this calming effect, Island Park and Bay Park would have seen greater

the future, we must keep in mind that while "green solutions" such as natural and constructed wetlands might mitigate some storm forces, they won't hold back rising water. Sandy and

many other storms --- like the 1962 Ash Wednesday and the Dec. II, 1992, nor'easters - demonstrated that. It's unreasonable to expect that constructed barrier islands and associated wetlands, complete with oyster reefs, will hold back rising water for an area like lower Manhattan. More traditional engineering approaches - such as the storm barriers that have been constructed in the Netherlands will be necessary.

These have their own issues, including environmental concerns, social issues (who's protected and who isn't?), cost and reliability.

On Long Island, it's impractical to consider constructing hard barriers to protect our extensive lagoonal systems. The entire ecological functioning of these lagoons would be altered. They and the ecosystems they protect cannot be maintained behind artificial fortifications.

eafaring people know not to turn their backs to the ocean. But, we as a society, have. We have built where we should not. When nature has its

way, we ask why government hasn't protected us and what it will do to help rebuild and protect us from the next event. The kind of punishing storm and associated surge once considered unlikely have now occurred. And while it could have been worse, with the current rate of sea-level rise, these extreme events will take place more often. A commonality of past East Coast storm surges is that with the passage of time and the persistence of property owners, communities have been re-established where they will inevitably be destroyed again.

Testimony and debate at the New York State Assembly Standing Committee on Environmental Conservation hearing Thursday in Lindenhurst showed that there are strong and differing views about how to deal with rebuilding devastated communities. It is time for our government at all levels to aggressively lead. Protect the wetlands, rebuild the dunes and construct new dunes where they didn't exist previously. Despite their limitations, these barrier islands and lagoons are our best de-

as New York Harbor, particularly off lower Manhattan, Staten Island and Jamaica Bay, require a creative mix of hard and soft solutions - not one or the other to lessen the impacts of waves, currents and surge.

Most important, government must have the backbone to require that construction be built back and up from the coastline. And because this rebuilding is occurring now, new guidelines must be immediately forthcoming. Zoning and building codes need to be strengthened and adhered to. Variances have been granted too often, and they must e reduced.

These measures are essential to save lives, preserve property and reduce the need for large taxpayer-supported subsidies when coastal flooding inevitably happens again.
