Minutes for the January 15, 2014 CEQ meeting were reviewed and discussed. A motion was made by Mr. Kaufman to approve the January 15, 2014 minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Swanson. Motion carried.

#### **Historic Trust Docket:**

Director's Report:

Mr. Martin updated the Council on the following:

- Housing Program: Mr. Martin stated that all available County housing units are currently occupied.
- Custodial Agreements:

Mr. Martin's update noted that staff has not had time to work on the custodial agreements because the staff has been working on the legislative grants awarded

to Suffolk County's historic sites. All letters awarding the grant funds have been sent out and now the contract office staff will be working up all the contracts and work programs for the different sites.

#### <u>Project Review:</u> Recommended Unlisted Actions:

A. Proposed Acquisition of Land by Suffolk County for Open Space Preservation Purposes known as the Sutera Property, located in the Mud Creek County Park area, Town of Brookhaven

Lauretta Fischer, Principal Environmental Analyst, Suffolk County Department of Economic Development and Planning, gave a presentation regarding the acquisition of a  $0.115\pm$  acre parcel which is part of a larger assemblage of land along Mud Creek in East Patchogue. Ms. Fisher noted that to date the County has acquired almost 130 acres of the 160 acre Mud Creek assemblage. Ms. Fischer also noted that the County is in the process of working on a comprehensive analysis of the Mud Creek watershed that includes the remediation of the Gallo Duck Farm which was acquired by the County through a tax lean process.

Mr. Kaufman made a motion to recommend classification of the proposed project as an Unlisted Action with a Negative Declaration. Mr. Swanson seconded the motion. Motion Carried.

B. Proposed Improvements to County Road 73, Roanoke Avenue, from State Route 25, Main Street to the Vicinity of County Road 58, Old Country Road, (CP#5562) Town of Riverhead.

Erik Bergey, Senior Civil Engineer, Suffolk County Department of Public Works, gave a presentation regarding the proposed project. It was noted that the project involves the full reconstruction of curbs and sidewalks, necessary drainage improvements, and asphalt resurfacing and/or full-depth reconstruction as pavement condition warrants. The project also includes the installation of permeable concrete gutters, new leaching basins, and hydrodynamic stormwater treatment systems.

Mr. Kaufman made a motion to recommend classification of the proposed project as an Unlisted Action with a Negative Declaration. The motion included that all necessary permits and approvals will be obtained from New York State Department of Conservation. The motion also included that to the greatest extent possible any trees removed will be replaced with wire friendly and sidewalk friendly trees and if possible said replacement trees will be placed on private property with permission from the landowner. Ms. Growney seconded the motion. Motion Carried.

C. Proposed Rehabilitation of County Road 13, Crooked Hill Road, from County Road 7, Wicks Road, to County Road 106, Campus Road, Brentwood, (CP#5538) Town of Islip.

Christopher Poelker, Junior Civil Engineer, Suffolk County Department of Public Works, gave a presentation regarding rehabilitation of County Road 13 which will address the pavement, sidewalk, and drainage deficiencies in the corridor. This will be done by installing a positive drainage system, expansion of two existing recharge basins, full depth pavement patching, resurfacing, the replacement of curb, sidewalk, pavement markings and the necessary traffic signal modifications.

Mr. Bagg made a motion to recommend classification of the proposed project as an Unlisted Action with a Negative Declaration. The motion also included that to the greatest extent possible any trees removed will be replaced with wire friendly and sidewalk friendly trees and if possible said replacement trees will be placed on private property with permission from the landowner. Ms. Spencer seconded the motion. Motion Carried.

#### **Recommended Type II Actions:**

A. Proposed Construction of check-in station at Cedar Point County Park, (CP#7009) Town of East Hampton.

John Corral, Planner, Suffolk County Department of Economic Development and Planning, described the three Suffolk County Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation projects. The projects involve the construction of new check-in stations at three County Parks. Mr. Corral presented this information because Nick Gibbons, Principal Environmental Analyst, Suffolk County Department of Parks, Recreation and Conservation, was not able to attend the meeting.

The Cedar Point County Park project involves the construction of a new park check-in station. The existing check-in station will be demolished.

Mr. Kaufman made a motion that the project be classified as a Type II action pursuant to Title 6 NYCRR Part 617.5(c)(2)(7)(20)(27). Ms. Growney seconded the motion. Motion Carried.

B. Proposed Construction of check-in station at Indian Island County Park, (CP#7009) Town of Riverhead.

The Indian Island County Park project involves the construction of a new park check-in station. The existing check-in station will be repurposed as a Park Ranger station for law enforcement use.

Ms. Growney made a motion that the project be classified as a Type II action pursuant to Title 6 NYCRR Part 617.5(c)(7)(20)(27). Mr. Kaufman seconded the motion. Motion Carried.

C. Proposed Construction of check-in station at Montauk County Park, (CP#7009) Town of East Hampton.

The Montauk County Park project involves the construction of a new park check-in station. The existing check-in station will be demolished.

Ms. Spencer made a motion that the project be classified as a Type II action pursuant to Title 6 NYCRR Part 617.5(c)(2)(7)(20)(27). Ms. Growney seconded the motion. Motion Carried.

#### **Recommendations for LADS Report:**

A. Recommendations for Legislative Resolutions Laid on the Table February 11, 2014

Mr. Corral noted that the staff's SEQRA recommendations are listed on the LADS report.

Mr. Kaufman asked if IR 1042-2014 "Establishing Guidelines for the Use of Methoprene in Suffolk County" was the same as the previous resolution on Methoprene that was reviewed by the CEQ. Mr. Corral noted that IR 1042-2014 was exactly the same as the previous resolution and as a result staff's recommendation for IR 1042-2014 is the same as the CEQ's previous recommendation. The CEQ requested that staff call the Legislative Counsel's office and notify the office of the CEQ's SEQRA recommendation for IR 1042-2014.

Mr. Kaufman also inquired as to whether IR 1091-2014 "To extend deadline for Tick and Vector-Borne Diseases Task Force" was the same as IR 1095-2014 "Creating a Tick Control Advisory Committee". Mr. Corral explained that IR 1091-2014 relates to a task force that was set up a few years ago and IR 1095-2014 relates to a new advisory committee.

Mr. Kaufman noted that he personally did not agree with IR 1048-2014 "Authorizing the Suffolk County's Law Enforcement Agencies to donate decommissioned body armored vests to local emergency service provides". Mr. Kaufman noted that he feels that in some cases the decommissioned body armored vests may no longer be as protective as originally intended. Mr. Kaufman abstained from voting on this resolution. Ms. Growney also abstained from voting on this resolution.

Mr. Bagg made a motion to accept staff recommendations as presented for the February 11, 2014 Legislative Resolutions. The motion was seconded by Ms. Spencer. Motion carried.

#### **Other Business:**

As a follow up to the January 15, 2014 CEQ discussion on IR 1002-2014 "Authorizing an agreement to revitalize Cedar Island Lighthouse", Mr. Swanson asked Mr. Martin if Parks had discussed this resolution with Legislator Schneiderman. Mr. Martin informed the Council that Parks Commissioner Dawson spoke with Legislator Schneiderman and explained that there is an existing contract in place that allows for the ideas that this organization has for the restoration of the Lighthouse. Mr. Martin also noted the County Attorney's office is working with Legislator Schneiderman to make sure his concerns are addressed.

Ms. Growney noted that the LIRR is using antifreeze on the train tracks and asked if this might represent an environmental concern. Ms. Russo noted that the type of antifreeze the LIRR uses is very benign and therefore does not represent an environmental concern.

Ms. Spencer requested that the next CEQ meeting, which is scheduled for March 19, 2014, be held at the Scully Estate in Islip. The Council agreed to have the meeting at the Scully Estate.

RESOLUTION NO. - 2013 AUTHORIZING THE ACQUISITION OF LAND UNDER THE NEW SUFFOLK COUNTY DRINKING WATER PROTECTION PROGRAM (EFFECTIVE DECEMBER 1. 2007) – OPEN SPACE COMPONENT FOR THE SUTERA PROPERTY - MUD CREEK (TOWN OF BROOKHAVEN SCTM#0200-973.60-03.00--013.000)

WHEREAS, Local Law No. 24-2007, "A Charter Law Extending and Accelerating the Suffolk County ¼% Drinking Water Protection Program for Environmental Protection," Section C12-2(A)(1) authorized the use of 31.10 percent of sales and compensating tax proceeds generated each year for environmental protection, as determined by duly enacted Resolutions of the County of Suffolk; and

Please be advised that we have reviewed the Phase I Environmental Site Assessment for the above referenced property transmitted by your office. The assessment prepared by Advanced Cleanup Technologies, Inc. is in compliance with the 11/25/08 Environmental Site Assessment Criteria required by the Suffolk County Department of Economic Development and Planning and Division of Real Estate. Based on the information within the assessment concerning the recent site survey, the review of existing EPA, NYSDEC and Suffolk County Department of Health Services' records in relation to toxic and hazardous waste sites, as well as the historical review of the site and its surrounding areas, it appears that the property in question does not contain recognized environmental conditions.

It is however recommended that the following issue be addressed prior to acquisition:

1) The Phase I Environmental Site Assessment noted an abandoned old truck, discarded metal railing, and a discarded lumber pile on the subject property. All of this material should be removed and properly disposed of prior to acquisition.







## **GENERAL NOTES**

1. The Datum used on this project is arbitrary.

- 2. All slopes are to be trimmed and graded to meet existing ground conditions as directed by the Engineer. All areas disturbed by the construction shall be graded and finished as indicated on the Typical Sections or as directed by the Engineer.
- 3. The Contractor's attention is directed to the Golden Nematode quarantine of the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets regulating the movements of top soil, machinery and equipment in Nassau and Suffolk Counties, and concerning the European Chafer regulating the movement of materials and equipment in or from Kings County. Detailed instruction and assistance in the necessary steam cleaning may be obtained from the field agent. Telephone (631)288-1751 or write the Dept. of Agriculture & Markets, 4 Stewart Ave. Westhampton Beach, New York 11978.
- 4. The Contractor's attention is directed to the Vehicle and Traffic Law of the State of New York in regard to the size and weight of vehicles. The Contractor is hereby notified that no vehicle in excess of the limits set by the Vehicle and Traffic Law will be allowed on any public road.
- 5. For all maintenance and protection of traffic (MPT) notes and details see MPT notes and details sheets.
- 6. Any trench, pit or other excavation that is open and unattended shall be protected, as directed by the Engineer, with fence, barricades or another approved method. No direct payment will be made for this work. All excavations shall be conducted in compliance with New York Industrial Code Rule No. 23-1.33, 2-8, 53 and OSHA Safety and Health Standards (29 CFR 1926/1910).
- 7. Whenever items in the contract requires material to be removed and disposed of, the cost of supplying a disposal area and transportation to that area shall be included in the unit price bid for those items.
- 8. All road metal on abandoned roadways shall be removed and the areas regraded and seeded as ordered by the Engineer.
- 9. Use of breaker ball will not be permitted.
- 10. No trees shall be removed unless so ordered by the Engineer.
- 11. Restore all driveways as directed by the Engineer.
- 12. Clear and grub as shown on plans or as directed by the Engineer.
- 13. Excavation of unsuitable material will be paid for under Item No. 2AS "Unclassified Excavation", unless Item for "Unsuitable Material" is included in the contract.
- 14. Grade, place select material, seed and mulch as shown on plans or as directed. Use material available on site unless otherwise stated in the plan.
- 15. Retain all existing drainage structures and pipe, except as shown on plans or as ordered by the Engineer. Payment for cleaning existing drainage structures and pipes is to be included in the cost of other items unless otherwise stated in the plan.
- 16. Cutting Pavement and Sidewalk Item No. 205 will be paid only at the locations indicated on the plans or as ordered by the Engineer.
- 17. The Contractor's attention is directed to the RECLAIMED ASPHALT CONCRETE PAVEMENT (RAP) option as outlined in the project proposal.
- 18. The Contractor is advised that the plans and other contract documents have been prepared based on the best currently available field data. However, actual field conditions may vary requiring modifications to the construction details and work quantities. The Contractor shall advise the Engineer of variations in field conditions, and modify his work to conform to these conditions, as ordered by the Engineer.
- 19. The Contractor shall not work on both sides of the roadway in the same area at the same time time unless approved by the Engineer.
- 20. In order to allow for snow and ice control by 'COUNTY' forces along the job site, the Contractor shall schedule work in accordance with the following:
- A) Interference with snow plowing operations by drums, barricades and other traffic control equipment shall be kept to a minimum. Any devices disturbed or damaged by snow and ice control operations shall be replaced and/or reset as necessary and as soon as possible by the contractor, costs included in item 76SX.
- B) Drainage frames, grates, and covers shall not be adjusted in travel lanes unless the final pavement course is to be placed prior to onset of snow and ice weather. If any of these protrusions exist in a non-travel lane prior to a snow and ice condition, then temporary asphalt ramps must be placed so that for every 1" of rise there is a 4' run of ramp.
- C) All pavement cuts shall be restored to be flush with the pavement to eliminate recessed areas where snow cannot be plowed.
- 21. When new overlays are notched into the existing pavement at the limits of resurfacing, the Contractor shall either place the proposed asphalt within 48 hours of the milling or other preparation of the notch or shall place a temporary wedge of asphalt AOBE to eliminate the bump created by the notch. The cost of this work shall be included in the price bid for Item 51FX.
- 22. Measures shall be taken to avoid spillage of asphalt concrete mix into storm grates. Any such material entering any grates shall be removed immediately by the contractor at his/her expense AOBE.
- 23. Remove plowable markers prior to commencing construction. Cost to be paid for under other Items.
- 24. Upon project completion, the area within the County Right of Way shall be cleaned thoroughly and free of all debris including, but not limited to plastic bottles, paper cups, etc. Additionally sidewalks, both existing and new, shall be swept and edged. All areas under guide-railing, signs, and appurtenances also shall be cleaned of debris. Payment for this cleaning shall be included in Item 1SB.
- 25. High-Visibility safety apparel shall be worn by all foot traffic workers to provide conspicuity during both daytime and nighttime usage. This safety apparel shall meet Performance Class 2 and 3 requirements of the ANSI/ISEA 107-2004 publication entitled "American National Standard for High-Visibility Safety Apparel and Headwear".
- 26. All work is to be done within the right of way. The Contractor shall ensure that no worker encroaches on to private property, unless ordered by the engineer.
- 27. The Contractor shall place asphalt concrete pavement overlay on all milled pavement surfaced within 7 days of milling.

- 1. The Contractor shall restore all disturbed areas with topsoil and seeding as shown on the plans or as ordered by the Engineer. Areas of disturbance shall remain within the limits of clearing, grading and ground disturbance.
- 2. The Contractor shall be aware of and fully comply with the conditions set forth in the permit(s) issued by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. These Conditions are included in the Project Manual, as well as the permit itself.
- 3. Any demolition debris, excess construction materials, and/or excess excavated materials shall be immediately and completely disposed of on an approved upland site more than 100 feet from any regulated freshwater wetland. These materials shall be suitably stabilized so as not to re-enter any wetland or water body.
- 4. All fill shall consist of clean soil, sand and/or gravel that is free of the following substances: asphalt, slag, flyflash, broken concrete, demolition debris, garbage, household refuse, tires, woody materials including tree or landscape debris, and metal objects. The introduction of materials toxic to aquatic life is expressly prohibited.
- 5. All equipment and machinery shall be stored and safely contained greater than 100 feet landward of the regulated wetland or water body at the end of each workday. This will serve to avoid the inadvertent leakage of deleterious substances into the regulated area.
