Chairwoman Russo revised the meeting agenda so that the CEQ could take the Project Review out of order and consider it at the beginning of the meeting and move the Historic Trust Docket to the end of the meeting to allow time for a presentation by Enrico Nardone, Executive Director of Seatuck Environmental Association.

<u>Project Review:</u> (Taken Out of Order) Recommended Unlisted Actions:

A. Proposed Installation of Public Safety Radio Communication Equipment at Babylon (1st Precinct Monopole), Port Jefferson (Roof of St. Charles Hospital), and Montauk County Park (GATR Site) as Part of the Countywide System Enhancements to the 800 MHz Radio Communication System Project (CP #3241)

Michael Postel, Police Communications Systems Director, Suffolk County Police Department, gave a presentation on the proposed project which involves the installation of radio communications equipment at the 1st Police Precinct in Babylon, St. Charles Hospital in Port Jefferson, and the GATR site in Montauk. This equipment installation will improve public safety radio communications in areas that currently have poor radio signals and will allow people located in these areas to communicate adequately with Suffolk County Police Headquarters.

Mr. Postel stated that at the 1st Police Precinct in Babylon the project will add a police antenna next to an identical existing antenna on the 1st Police Precinct Monopole. The additional needed equipment will be stored in the basement of the 1st Police Precinct building.

Mr. Postel noted that in Port Jefferson a police antenna will be installed on the St. Charles Hospital roof next to several exiting roof antennas. The additional communications equipment will be installed within the hospital and will replace existing Police communications equipment.

Mr. Postel described that the proposed project at the GATR Site in Montauk. Mr. Postel noted that this project is an update to a 2007 CEQ reviewed emergency communications project which included the installation of 2 antenna poles but unlike the current plan also included the installation of equipment structures to house communication equipment. In addition, in 2007 the installation was planned to be done by a private cell carrier company and now the installation is planned to be done

by the County. Mr. Postel also specified that the two installed monopoles at the GATR site will replace two existing wood poles and said monopoles will be brown in color, not stripped or lit, and will not exceed the height of the existing wood poles at the GATR site.

Mr. Kaufman made a motion to recommend classification of the proposed project as an Unlisted Action with a Negative Declaration. The motion included the reasons in the SEQRA determination of non-significance for the 2007 GATR site project (Suffolk County Resolution No. 1334-2007). The motion also included that the installed monopoles at the GATR site will replace two of the existing wood poles on the GATR site and that said monopoles will be brown in color, not stripped or lit, and will not exceed the height of the existing wood poles at the GATR site. Mr. Gulbransen seconded the motion. Motion Carried.

Minutes:

CAC Concerns:

Ms. Squires stated that she wanted to inform the Council regarding the importance of Carbon Monoxide (CO) monitors. Ms. Squires noted that she recently attended a Cleaner Greener LI meeting where Neil Lewis spoke about the importance of CO monitors. Ms. Squires shared with the Council some of the information she gained regarding CO monitors including the importance of using a digital monitor. Ms. Squires also noted that Town of Brookhaven is having a Public Hearing on 25th of March to consider new legislation introduced by Supervisor Ed Romaine to declare March "Carbon Monoxide Poisoning Awareness Month". The Town Board of Huntington is considering resolutions on April 5th regarding legislation to require carbon monoxide monitors in commercial buildings.

Legislator Hahn noted that the Suffolk County Legislature just passed a resolution relating to equipping first responders, public health nurses, restaurant inspectors, and County employees that enter businesses and homes with portable CO detectors.

SUBJECT: C.P.3241—Countywide System Enhancements to the 800MHz Radio Communications System

Per the 2014 Adopted Capital Budget, the Police Department is currently preparing the appropriating resolution for the above referenced project.

This project provides funds for the installation of equipment to improve public safety radio communications at several locations. The sites are Babylon (1st Pct. Monopole), Port Jefferson (roof of St. Charles) and Montauk (new site). The Montauk project was previously reviewed by CEQ and was determined to be an unlisted action, which will not have significant impacts on the environment by Suffolk County Resolution No. 1334-2007. The installation of nationally recognized P25 compliant equipment will enhance wireless communication in each of these areas. A P25 site is a miniature trunking system needed to fill in communication gaps in areas that have poor radio signals, and will help ensure quality communications. This equipment will allow users of these tower sites to communicate adequately with Suffolk Police Headquarters.

Please take the necessary action to supply the appropriate SEQRA clause to be included in the resolution.

WHEREAS, the Suffolk County Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) has reviewed a project designated as the "Proposed Emergency Communications Facility at the GATR Facility, T. Roosevelt Co. Park, Town of East Hampton", pursuant to Section 6 of Local Law No. 22-1985 which project involves the construction of two wireless communications antenna poles and associated equipment structures at the Roosevelt County Park GATR site to transmit 911 and emergency service calls; and

WHEREAS, an Environmental Assessment Form (EAF) was prepared and submitted to the CEQ Office by the Suffolk County Department of Parks and subsequently sent out to all concerned parties; and

WHEREAS, at its November 21, 2007 meeting, the CEQ reviewed the EAF and information submitted by the Suffolk County Department of Parks; and

WHEREAS, the CEQ recommended that the above activity be considered an unlisted action, pursuant to the provisions of Title 6 NYCRR, Part 617 and Chapter 279 of the Suffolk County Code; and

WHEREAS, the CEQ has advised the County Legislature and the County Executive by memo dated November 26, 2007 of said recommendations; and

WHEREAS, Section 279-5(H) of the SUFFOLK COUNTY CODE requires the Presiding Officer to introduce legislation for an appropriate SEQRA determination; and

WHEREAS, the Suffolk County Legislature has reviewed the EAF and the CEQ recommendations; now, therefore be it

- **1st RESOLVED**, that this Legislature hereby determines that the Proposed Emergency Communications Facility at the GATR Facility, T. Roosevelt Co. Park, Town of East Hampton constitutes an unlisted action, pursuant to the provisions of Title 6 NYCRR, Part 617 and Chapter 279 of the Suffolk County Code, which project will not have significant adverse impacts on the environment for the following reasons:
 - 1.) The proposed action will not exceed any of the criteria in Section 617.7 of Title 6 NYCRR, which sets forth thresholds for determining significant effect on the environment; and
 - 2.) The proposal does not appear to significantly threaten any unique or highly valuable environmental or cultural resources as identified in or regulated by the Environmental Conservation Law of the State of New York or the Suffolk County Charter and the Suffolk County Code; and

- 3.) The parcel does not appear to suffer from any severe environmental development constraints (limiting soil properties; no high groundwater and no unmanageable slopes); and
- 4.) The project is compatible with the historic use of the site which served as a cross Atlantic telecommunication facility during World War II and after; and
- 5.) The two (2) antenna poles will replace existing poles on the site; and
- 6.) A Stage 1A and Stage 1B Archaeological Survey of the GATR facility has concluded that no significant archaeological resources exist at this site; and
- 7.) The former antenna poles at the GATR site serve as a navigation reference point for small offshore boats; and be it further



At its March 19, 2014 meeting, the CEQ reviewed the above referenced matter. Pursuant to Chapter 450 of the Suffolk County Code, and based on the information received, as well as that given in a presentation by Michael Postel, Police Communications Systems Director, Suffolk County Police Department, the Council advises the Suffolk County Legislature and County Executive, in CEQ Resolution No. 15-2014, a copy of which is attached, that the proposed project be considered an Unlisted Action under SEQRA that will not have significant adverse impacts on the environment.

If the Legislature concurs with the Council on Environmental Quality's recommendation that the project will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment, the Presiding Officer should cause to be brought before the Legislature for a vote, a resolution determining that the proposed action is an Unlisted Action pursuant to SEQRA that will not have significant adverse impacts on the environment (negative declaration). However, if the Legislature has further environmental concerns regarding this project and needs additional information, the Presiding Officer should remand the case back to the initiating unit for the necessary changes to the project and EAF or submit a resolution authorizing the initiating unit to prepare a draft environmental impact statement (positive declaration).

- WHEREAS, at its March 19, 2014 meeting, the Suffolk County Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) reviewed the EAF and associated information submitted by the Suffolk County Police Department; and
- WHEREAS, a presentation regarding the project was given at the meeting by Michael Postel, Police Communications Systems Director, Suffolk County Police Department; and
- WHEREAS, the project involves the installation of radio communications equipment at the 1st Police Precinct in Babylon, St. Charles Hospital in Port Jefferson, and the GATR site in Montauk; and
- WHEREAS, this equipment installation will improve public safety radio communications in areas that currently have poor radio signals and allow people located in these areas to communicate adequately with Suffolk County Police Headquarters; and
- WHEREAS, the equipment installed at the 1st Police Precinct in Babylon includes an approximately 8 foot long antennae which will be located next to an identical existing antenna on the 1st Police Precinct Monopole as well as additional communication equipment to be stored in the basement of the 1st Police Precinct Building; and
- WHEREAS, the equipment installed on the St. Charles Hospital roof includes an approximately 8 foot long antennae which will be located next to exiting roof antennas as well as additional communications equipment installed within the hospital which will replace existing Police communications equipment; and
- WHEREAS, the equipment installed at the GATR site in Montauk includes antennas attached to the top of two monopoles and additional communications equipment installed inside an existing concrete storage building; and
- **WHEREAS,** the two installed monopoles at the GATR site will replace two of the existing wood poles on the GATR site and said monopoles will be brown in color, not stripped or lit, and will not exceed the height of the existing wood poles at the GATR site; and
- WHEREAS, the proposed project at the GATR site is an update to a 2007 reviewed emergency communications project which included the installation of 2 antenna poles but unlike the current plan also included the installation of equipment structures to house communication equipment; and
- WHEREAS, the 2007 proposed communication project at the GATR site was reviewed by the CEQ and the Suffolk County Legislature and received a SEQRA determination of non-significance as indicated in Suffolk County Resolution No. 1334-2007; now, therefore, be it

- 1st RESOLVED, that based on the information received and presented, a quorum of the CEQ hereby recommends to the Suffolk County Legislature and the County Executive that the proposed project be classified as an Unlisted Action under the provisions of Title 6 NYCRR Part 617 and Chapter 450 of the Suffolk County Code; and, be it further
- **2nd RESOLVED,** that based on the information received, a quorum of the CEQ recommends to the Suffolk County Legislature and County Executive, pursuant to Title 6 NYCRR Part 617 and Chapter 450 of the Suffolk County Code, that the proposed project will not have significant adverse impacts on the environment for the following reasons:
 - 1. the proposed action will not exceed any of the criteria in Section 617.7 of Title 6 NYCRR which sets forth thresholds for determining significant effect on the environment, as demonstrated in the Environmental Assessment Form;
 - 2. the proposal does not appear to significantly threaten any unique or highly valuable environmental or cultural resources as identified in or regulated by the Environmental Conservation Law of the State of New York or the Suffolk County Charter and Code;
 - 3. the parcels do not appear to suffer from any severe Environmental development constraints (limiting soil properties; no high groundwater and no unmanageable slopes);
